Program Expectations

“It’s not about good, it’s not about bad. It’s about better.”

This attitude of getting better each and every day must begin with an attitude of success. As teachers, parents, and administrators, all of our actions must be geared towards creating positive experiences for these young student musicians. A positive experience must begin with an understanding of the expectations for those who participate in the OGMS Band Program.

1) BE PROMPT

“Early is on time, on time is late, and late is unacceptable.” Students must be prompt when arriving every day for rehearsal, for any after school rehearsal, performances, trips, etc. Timeliness is key to success, and therefore key to a pursuit of excellence.

2) BE PREPARED

This expectation addresses two different areas of preparedness. The first is having all required materials (listed on page 11) for class, every day. Remember: it is always better to have something and not need it than to need something and not have it.

Second, students are responsible for preparing their parts to each and every piece we play in band. Practice is a crucial tool for success in the band world. Some may have to practice their instrument more than others to prepare a piece of music just as some have to study longer for a test. Whatever the case may be, all students should practice and prepare music for performances well ahead of the concert date.

3) BE RESPECTFUL

Students should demonstrate a mutual respect for their TEACHERS, CLASSMATES, and SURROUNDINGS. Disrespect, bullying, or anything that creates a negative learning atmosphere will not be tolerated in this band program. Surroundings include, but are not limited to, the band room, instruments, other equipment, storage areas, etc. We are fortunate enough to have a fine facility to rehearse in; we need to keep it that way.

4) NO FOOD, DRINKS, OR GUM ALLOWED IN THE BAND ROOM

As it was mentioned before, we need to respect our surroundings. There are instruments that are worth thousands of dollars in our band room, and one spilled drink or playing right after eating a snack could severely damage the instrument. If food, drinks, or gum is brought into the band room and consumed at any point, it will be confiscated/disposed of by Mr. Larsen. (The only possible exception is bottled water)

6th Grade Band

Beginning students may choose one of four instruments: Flute, Clarinet, Trumpet or Trombone. Major focus points are posture, breathing, reading rhythms and musical notation accurately, understanding musical terminology, instrument care, and developing listening skills. Yearly, the 6th Grade Band will play at least 2 concerts. Upon successful completion of this course, students may be promoted to 7th Grade Band.

7th Grade Band

OGMS 7th Grade Band students will continue to work on skills learned in beginning band. They are grouped into two classes: Woodwinds and Brass/Percussion. Major focus points are posture, breathing, reading rhythms and musical notation accurately, understanding musical terminology, instrument care, developing listening skills and performing in a large ensemble setting.

Students will also have the opportunity to participate in small ensembles, county and district honor bands, solo/ensemble and Music Performance Adjudication concerts (explained later in the handbook.)

Yearly, the 7th Grade Band will play at least 3 concerts and will be given the opportunity to perform in additional concert events as explained later in the handbook. Upon successful completion of this course, students may be promoted to 8th Grade Band.

8th Grade Band

The 8th Grade Band is the top performance ensemble at OGMS. Advanced students will continue study on their instruments and are divided into two classes: Woodwinds/Percussion or Brass. Major focus points are posture, breathing, reading rhythms and musical notation accurately, understanding musical terminology, instrument care, developing listening skills, and participation skills in large and small ensembles.

Students will also have the opportunity to participate in small ensembles, county and district honor bands, and solo/ensemble and concert Music Performance Adjudication concerts (explained later in the handbook.)

Yearly, the 8th Grade Band will play at least 3 concerts and will be given the opportunity to perform in additional concert events as explained later in the handbook. Upon successful completion of this course, students may be promoted to High School Band.

Grading

A student's grade in band is a balanced reflection of musical achievement, technical skill on an instrument, participation in band activities, and effort both within class and at home. The grade is made-up of many things categorized into groups to align with the Davidson County Schools Grading Policy: Major grades (40%) are primarily concerts. Minor grades (35%) would be things such as quizzes and pass-offs (more detail provided below). Classwork/Homework grades (25%) are worksheets and daily participation. We have defined items from the categories in more detail below.

(The grading scale (A - F) may be found in the OGMS Student Handbook located in their agenda.)

Participation

You will receive a daily rehearsal grade that is based on the following:

1. You are prepared with instrument, music, pencil, and you have practiced. If you do not have your required items, you will receive a 0 for the day's participation grade
2. You are on-time and seated when class begins
3. You participate in class appropriately

At-Home Practice

6th grade is a crucial time to develop instrumental skills; therefore, consistent practice is expected of all students so that they can build a successful foundation for the rest of their involvement in music. Students are expected to practice at least 60 minutes a week (less than 10 minutes a day if practiced daily).

Some parent tips for encouraging successful practice time at home

1. Provide a quiet place for practice (free from electronic devices and other distractions.)
2. Encourage regular practice in a positive manner. Students may not always be able to hear daily improvement, but it is happening.
3. Provide a working instrument that is in good condition. Quality yields quality.
4. Give encouragement and praise and show commitment in their study of music. Some concepts will be learned very quickly and others will require much practice. Encourage patience and persistence.

5. Have them perform for you often. It means more to the student if they have the opportunity to actually play for an audience. Schedule some private “concerts” for your family!

Playing Tests/Pass-Offs

Playing tests will consist of students playing specific music on their instruments in order to chart mastery of specific skills. Students will be given a minimum of one week’s notice before a playing test. These tests will be submitted electronically through Google Classroom. There will be at least 4 playing tests each quarter.

Pass-Offs are an opportunity for students to perform lines of music from their method book. Lines performed successfully are passed off and “belts” are earned along with prizes. Pass-Offs are completed outside of class time, either during Den Time or after school.

Performances

Concert performances are one of the most important and fun things we do in band! For all purposes, these are our tests. Students will be graded on how well they prepare for and perform their concert music, but most importantly, students will be graded on attendance. Most of the concert music will be different from and in addition to the music they are working on in their band books. There will be more on concert performances later in the handbook.

Switching to a better version of the same instrument – 6th Grade

1) Most of the instruments that beginners have are “student model” instruments. These instruments will provide them with all they need in order to have a successful shot at learning to play them. Some students, especially those that excel quickly, may be interested and ready to “step-up” to a more advanced version of their current instrument. These instruments have advanced features that will increase their playing ability and will make them sound even better. I recommend that parents check with the band director before purchasing or renting any type of “step-up” instrument. There are instruments out there that are branded “step-up”, “intermediate”, or even “professional” by the manufacturer and are really nothing more than a beginner horn with a few extra features. Again, check with me to make sure you really are getting a “step-up” model with the features needed by the advancing musician. Parents and students are encouraged to wait until at least the spring of 6th grade year to consider stepping-up.

2) Larger wind instruments (tuba, french horn, bass clarinet, etc.) Later in the school year, some students will be invited to play some of our school’s larger “color” instruments, named that because they provide additional tone colors to our band, increasing our band’s rich sound. Most of these instruments are owned by OGMS and would not have to be purchased or rented by the student. Students will be

invited to try-out on these instruments based on their interest and if the director thinks they would be successful on that instrument. More specific details will be explained to each student when invited to play one of these instruments.

3) Percussion and Alto Saxophone

In late November, students that are interested will be given the opportunity to “audition” for a spot in the OGMS percussion or alto saxophone sections. We will have a mini-camp for each that will teach some basic skills and then students will be selected. Approximately 6-8 percussionists and 4-6 alto saxophone players will be selected based on skill, previous work ethic and attitude. Only the hardest-working OGMS band students will be considered for these sections. Students that have taken private piano lessons are encouraged to audition for percussion and alto saxophone players must have started on clarinet.

Required Materials

Part of being prepared for success is having the right equipment and supplies.

Below is a list of all materials every student will need for class:

- **Instrument** – personal or school-owned
- **Tradition of Excellence red book (6th graders only)**
- **Black band binder** – please note that this binder should be dedicated only to band music and other important handouts; do not use it for other classes
- **Pencils** – always have a pencil with you in class. Never write on music or other materials with pen or a marker unless cleared by Mr. Larsen
- ***Accessories*** – In the “Important Forms” section, there is a checklist of materials, including all necessary accessories for each instrument group. There is also an accessory order form on the back of that form. If you need to order anything, fill it out and return it to Mr. Larsen with cash or a check made out to “The Band Company”

Instruments

Personal Instruments

Instruments that are owned (including rentals) by students may be stored in the band room during the school day and may be left overnight. However, instruments must go home twice a week, especially on Friday for the weekend.

The student is responsible for any costs involved in keeping the instrument in playing condition including supplies (reeds, oil, etc.) and repairs that may be needed. Many instruments that are being rented (rent-to-own in most cases) from a music store will be serviced as part of the rental fee. Students are expected to have instruments that are in working order at all times, including working reeds for woodwind players. Instrument cases should also have a nametag for identification.

Parents are encouraged to record information about the instrument including serial number, make, description, purchase/lease information and even take pictures of the instrument in case of theft or damage.

School-Owned Instruments

Instruments that are owned by OGMS will be stored at the school and checked-out by students when played. OGMS will be responsible for the maintenance and repair of these instruments. Damage caused purposely by a student will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis. Students that play these instruments may take them home to practice or will set-up a time outside of class to practice them at school (for larger instruments like tuba or percussion.)

School-owned instruments are not to be treated as “free” instruments. Students must purchase basic supplies (reeds, etc.) and mouthpieces. Students should treat these instruments as if their parents purchased them. **Some of these instruments exceed \$6000.00 in value!**

Band Room Etiquette

As mentioned before, we must have respect for our surroundings. Such a new and fine facility like our band room needs to be maintained for years and years to come. That being said, here are some rules pertaining to the upkeep of the band room:

- No Littering (use a trash can)
- No food, candy, GUM, or drinks of any kind, except for water (must be in a container with a lid that closes)
- No graffiti of any kind, especially on the music stands
- Keep instruments on the shelves when not in use (not the floor)
- Do not touch instruments or equipment that are not yours, especially the percussion equipment
- Ask permission to enter the band office

Attendance Policy/ Concert Information

Participation in all OGMS performances is mandatory!

These performances are our tests and demonstrate the culmination of many weeks of hard work by our students. They are some of the most rewarding and fun events we have in band! Each grade level will have at least 2-3 formal full band concerts this school year.

Concert Absences/Absences from any required event

- a. **Excused** – Absences may be excused if proper notice is given AND the reason is significant (planned wedding, major family vacation, etc.). The student must fill out an Absence Request form (located in back of handbook) and submit it to Mr. Larsen one week before the event in question.

Last minute absences may also be excused, but only in the case of illness, death in the immediate family, or a legitimate emergency situation. Please contact Mr. Larsen by email or phone as soon as possible (preferably before the concert or event in question) regarding the absence.

Excused absences from a concert must be made-up through a two-part assignment. The student will perform an excerpt of the concert music and will write about the piece performed. Work must be completed within one week of the absence

- b. **Unexcused** - missing a concert performance or required event for any reason other than those listed above will be unexcused. "I didn't have a ride," "I forgot," etc. are unacceptable. An unexcused absence may not be made-up and will result in a significant lowering of the student's grade.

Concert Attire

More information will be sent home regarding concert attire for the upcoming school year.

Concert Etiquette

We will have lessons in proper behavior and procedures as a performer in a concert. It is important to both the listener and performer that proper behavior is followed during the concert so that all in attendance may enjoy the performance. Concerts are formal events and should be treated as such.

Communication

Communication is an integral part of a successful band program. Mr. Howell, the Band Boosters, and I will be relaying pertinent information through a variety of methods. I have listed them for you below:
